urope is made for walking. Trails crisscross the continent, offering a path for every person. Walking tours are increasingly popular. Here are seven of our favorite tours:

Portugal's Douro Valley: Walking & Wine with Exodus Travels

Walking & Wine With Exoduls I ravels
New for 2016, this leisurely eight-day guided tour leads
you on quiet country paths, some dating back to the 13th
century, and often ending at a winery where you'll enjoy
tastings. The Douro Valley is a UNESCO World Heritage
Site and the only place where both port and vinho verde
wines are produced. Gain insight into the history of wine
production while walking beside steeply terraced vineyards
and along meandering rivers. Delicious regional cuisine
includes fish from the Douro River, rossted goat and wild
boat stew exodustravels.com.

Price: \$1,695 per person

Why this tour? The walks are gentle and the hotels luxurious.

Italy's Amalfi Coast with Butterfield & Robinson

Camino de Santiago with Country Walkers

Christians have walked a network of routes through northern Spain for more than a millen-nium, finishing their pilgrimage at the tomb of the apostle St. James in Santiago de Compostela. More recently, people walk it for recreational rather than religious reasons. Either way, it's a long jaunt — about 500 milles from the French border — and takes a couple of months. Instead, walk the best parts in just nine days on this guided tour that takes in the green hills of the Basque region, the rugged Pyrenees and the beaches of Galicia. countrywalkers.com.

Price: \$5,998 per person Why this tour? Instead of sleeping in hostel bunks you'll enjoy boutique hotels.

The Ass-ential Stevenson with the Enlightened Traveller

With the Emigrifichted Travener
Robert Louis Stevenson walled this route in
1878 and his subsequent book, Traveds With a
Dorbeq'n in the Cecennes, made it a modern
classic. The Ass-ential Stevenson is a three-day,
27-mile self-guided walk through the rugged
countryside of the Upper Loire Valley with your
own local donkey — with training in donkey
management provided beforehand! People
who've walked part of the route have enjoyed if who've walked part of the route have enjoyed it so much they've returned to complete the entire 149-mile trail. walking-holidays-france.com. Price: About \$672 per person

Why this tour? There's emergency telephone backup and assistance for the donkey.

King Ludwig's Way with Sherpa Expeditions

This self-guided, eight-day trek takes you past lakes, mountains and gorges of Bavaria, where the eccentric King Ludwig once ruled and walked. Discover the German state that's rich with baroque architecture, onion-shaped church spires and ancient monaster-ies. Fortify yourself along the way with kuchen ies. Forthy yoursen anoig the way with attener (cakes), coffee and — at the Andechs monas-tery — the monks' dark and potent brew. Fin-ish your journey at the fairy-tale castle at Neuschwanstein, Ludwig's architectural mas-terpiece, sherpaexpeditions.com.

Cornwall Coast Path with HF Holidays

You may not be up for walking England's 630-mile South West Coast Path, but just about anyone can enjoy some or all of the seemic Cornish section. Whether it's rugged coastal cliffs with remnants from its tin min-ing past, or long stretches of sandy, white beaches and dolphins playing offshore, the

Cornish Coast offers superb walks. Stop at pubs for Cornish pasties and a pint. Stay at Chymor-vah House in the seaside town of St. Ives throughout your stay and choose from three guided walks daily. hfholidays.co.uk.

Price: Three-, four- or seven-day tours start at about \$446 per person.

Tour du Mont Blanc with Alpine Treks

The Tour du Mont Blanc is one of the world's top mountain walks. Start in Chamo-nix, France, and walk through Italy and Switzerland as you circumnavigate the highest mountain in the Alps, crossing eight major mountain passes and seven major valleys, ascending and descending about 30,000 feet in total. It takes about 10 days to walk the entir route of about 100 miles, but you're rewarded with spectacular scenery and a variety of cul-tures and food. alpinetreks.co.uk.

by Fidel Castro took over in 1959, the U.S. declared a trade and tourism embargs on Cuba, and the flow of U.S. cars and parts and tourists to the fistand ceased.

Out of necessity, the pre-1960 cars have lived on, often with new Russian diesel motors and imprevised body work and parts.

Before we know it, we're back on Tejadillo, shaking hands with Rafie land handing him 20 Cuban pesses (about \$23\$) and darniring his car one last time. We celebrate our tourist predictability by finding Bar San Carlos and ordering mojitos, Cuba's national drink of crushed mint, rum, sugar syrup, line and hirt, rum, sugar syrup, line and by Fidel Castro took over in 1959,
