If Toronto and Vancouver Were Sisters

NE IS DROP-DEAD
GORGEOUS, the
other plain, but hard
working. One gets
away with wearing yoga
pants to work, and on
weekends doesn't get
out of bed until it's
almost lunch—so let's
skip breakfast and do
brunch! The other runs
errands on her days off,
so her weekdays are
productive.

Clichés exaggerate, of course, but when it comes to the two largest cities in Englishspeaking Canada, Vancouver and Toronto have distinctly different personalities.

Vancouver was still a gleam in gold prospectors' eyes when Toronto was named and crawling in 1834. Toronto's head start is understandable, given that Canada was explored, then settled, from east to west. Today, Toronto has almost 3 million people (6.1 million in Greater Toronto) and is the country's financial

hub, as well as its most multicultural city—half its residents were born outside Canada. It's a place where you can lose yourself in sport, culture, entertainment, and shopping.

Toronto is home to the Canadian Opera Company, the National Ballet of Canada, Royal Ontario Museum, Art Gallery of Ontario, ten major theaters, seven professional sports teams, 57 outdoor swimming pools and in winter—50 outdoor skating/hockey rinks.

The first museum in North America solely devoted to Islamic art—the Aga Khan Museum—opened here in 2014—and the year before that Ripley's Aquarium of Canada moved in beside the CN Tower and Rogers Centre (where the Toronto Blue Jays play), creating a triple entertainment threat by the lake shore.

Feel like a festival? Toronto's tenday PRIDE in June is the largest in North America, and its Toronto International Film Festival is considered second only to Cannes in the world. Little wonder nonstop, fashion-forward Toronto is Canada's biggest tourist draw.



Just know that this city has two seasons -summer and winter -and one can be as brutally hot as the other is cold. Maybe this is why Toronto is known for its friendliness. It helps to gripe about the weather to others.

Instead of trying to emulate Big Sis, smaller laid-back Vancouver has always found her own way. Cut off from the rest of Canada by the prairies and Rocky Mountains, she had no choice. Vancouver doesn't have Toronto's economic clout, old money or political power. She's been struggling for years just to build a new public art gallery.

But one thing she has in spades is her looks. Flanked by mountains, with the sea lapping at her feet, Vancouver is extravagantly blessed by nature. Wild black bears routinely wander into Metro Vancouver and this winter a pair of beavers set up house in False Creek, a neighborhood near downtown.

Want to ski in the morning and sail in the afternoon? You can. Public transit is so good you can catch a city bus to the base of Grouse Mountain

every half hour (Bus 232 or 236.) Enjoy walking? Vancouver is Canada's most walkable city, scoring 78/100 by Walk Score (Toronto is 71.4).

But don't think for a minute that Vancouver doesn't have a head on her pretty shoulders. Last year the city hired a brand valuation company to assess its worth should an oil spill ever damage the city's pristine environment. (It's a major shipping port, with pipeline terminus nearby). The value of Vancouver's clean, Green 'brand'? \$31 billion, thank you.

If you visit in winter, especially in November and December, you'll experience clean for vourself, bathed in rain. On the other hand, summer is bliss - warm enough to sunbathe without baking.

Despite their many differences, Toronto and Vancouver share a taste for food. Wedged between farmlands

and ocean, Vancouver is well nourished. In fact, the 100-mile diet was born here. Choose from pricey Chinese restaurants (one of the city's nicknames is Hongcouver) to inexpensive street food, and everything inbetween.

Over the decades, Toronto has opened her arms to immigrants from all over the world and now boasts dozens of cuisines and tasty fusions. Where else but Toronto-and India -could a restaurant named Dindigul Thalappakattu Biriyani not only survive, but thrive?

Oh, and one more thing: it takes exactly 25 minutes to travel by public transit from either Toronto Pearson International Airport or Vancouver International Airport to each city's respective downtowns. How's that for sisterhood?
